Interactive Shared Learning

Interactive Shared Learning is a suite of online teaching activities that encourages students to learn about cybersafety in safe, school-based environments.

The Interactive Shared Learning activities help to educate and empower school students online, so they can make informed decisions about cybersafety issues in real-life situations.

Activities are provided free of charge to schools nationally through the Australian Communications and Media Authority's Cybersmart program—part of the Australian Government's commitment to cybersafety.



Activities

There are two unique one-hour Interactive Shared Learning activities:

- Cybersmart Detectives, which covers general internet safety issues
- Cybersmart Hero, which focuses on cyberbullying.

In the activities, students work in teams, online and in real-time, to resolve safety issues which are presented through a scripted scenario.

Students follow developments in the scenario through a series of messages, liaising with Cybersmart Guides who provide advice as the activity unfolds.

Cybersmart Detectives

Cybersmart Detectives is designed for upper primary school students, aged 10 to 12 years. In this activity, students learn about online safety and grooming, and the risks involved in posting personal information online.

Cybersmart Hero

Cybersmart Hero is designed for upper primary school or early high school students, aged 11 to 13 years. In this activity, students learn how to deal with cyberbullying and where they can get help.

Running an activity

To run an activity, teachers register their teams online and select a date to participate. Once this is confirmed, the teacher receives lesson plans and instructions which provide background information to help run the activity. Training is also provided for teachers and staff acting as Guides, so they are familiar with the activity before it is run in their school.

On the day, teams from registered schools participate simultaneously, linked by a central website on a secure server.

In the activity, students interact with Cybersmart Guides—school staff, police and internet safety experts, working in 'virtual control rooms' located throughout Australia.

Cybersmart Guides answer questions and give advice throughout the activity. All messages are moderated by a central control room. Student teams cannot communicate directly with each other or with anyone outside the activity.
